Motivation

In the Code of Ethics for Educators Principle II number 2 says, "The professional educator maintains sound mental health, physical stamina, and social prudence necessary to perform the duties of any professional assignment."

- according to Merriam-Webster's dictionary it means "devotion for a particular purpose" in this case education.




Dedication

As Eric Moore states in <u>My Educational Philosophy</u>, "I need to be prepared to seamlessly transition between these roles to effectively contribute to student learning:

- Facilitator (Primary): Helper in discovery process
- Teacher: Provider of information
- Instructor: Demonstrator of a skill
- Coach: Guider of learning
- o Consultant: Helper in problem solving
- o Counselor: Helper in life situations and feelings
- Mentor: Provider of guidance focused on professional or personal growth (LEAD Facilitator, 1999; ADRP 6-22, 2012)"

This means playing multiple roles to support student learning.

Ethical

- Ethical teachers go into teaching because (1) they want to make a difference, (2) they believe change is possible even if it takes years
- Ethical teachers take responsibility for their students learning
- Ethical teachers work with integrity and are honest with their students and their students' families on how they are doing academically. Are they at grade level? If not, what areas do students need improvement/support?



- Ethical teachers are positive role models for their students
- Ethical teachers believe in fairness and educational equity. Rather than giving all students the same tools, ethical teachers scaffold and accommodate based on their students' needs.
- Above all, ethical teachers keep their students at the forefront!





Inspired

An educator that is inspired looks for countless ways to improve. It could be dialogue with colleagues or researching ideas that will potentially translate to the classroom.

Beginning teachers seek opportunities to reflect on and improve their practice through collaborative inquiry, observation feedback, and their own performance data (Commission on Teacher Credentialing, 2016).

Inspired

An inspired educator cares about their craft, having a passion for it and conveying that passion to everyone, but mostly importantly to your students (Leblanc, 2010, par 1).

Leblanc (2010) Inspired teaching is about substance and treating students as consumers of knowledge. It's about doing your best to keep on top of your field, reading sources, inside and outside of your areas of expertise, and being at the leading edge as often as possible
